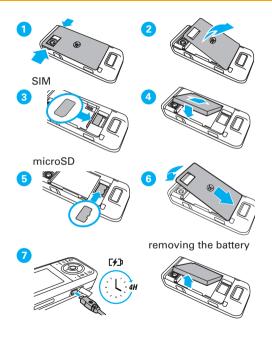

# let's go



### basics

#### here's a few essential basics:



### turn it on & off

Press and hold of for a few seconds to turn the phone on/off.

## menu navigation



Press the *centre key* • to open the **Main Menu**.



Press the *navigation key* •**Q**• up, down, right or left to highlight a menu option.



Press • or **Select** to select the highlighted option.

### calls

### it's good to talk



### make a call

Enter a number and press .



### answer a call

When your phone rings or vibrates, press .



## end a call

Press 💿.

### redial a number

- From the home screen, press to see a list of recently dialed calls.
- 2 Scroll to the entry you want to call and press .

## emergency calls



To call an emergency number, enter the emergency number and press .

Your service provider programs emergency phone numbers, (such as 112 or 911), that you can call under any circumstances, even when your phone is locked.

Emergency numbers vary by country. Your phone's pre-programmed emergency number(s) may not work in all locations, and sometimes an emergency call cannot be placed due to network, environmental, or interference issues.

## go handsfree

To turn the speaker on or off during a call, press Speaker.

**Note:** You can also use an optional 2.5 mm wired headset to go handsfree.

During a call you can access the in call menu by pressing **Options**:

- My Tel. Number view your phone number.
- Hold or Resume hold the call.
- Mute or Unmute silence your microphone.
- Spkrphone On or Off turn speakerphone on or off.
- Use Bluetooth or Use Handset turn Bluetooth on or off.
- Phonebook access list of contacts.
- New Call make another call.
- Dialed Calls view recently dialed calls.
- Received Calls view recently received calls.
- Messages access your messages menu.
- Calendar view calendar.

#### made a new friend?

### save a contact

- Enter the number on the home screen and press Save.
- 2 Enter the contact details and press Save again.

### call a contact

- Press ・ > Phonebook.
- 2 Scroll through the list to highlight the contact.
- 3 Press 6.

### send a contact

- Scroll through the list to highlight the contact.
- Press Options > Send Business Card > Select.
- Choose the phone number you want to send, and press OK.
- Select the message type, the person you are sending the contact to, and press Send.

### home screen shortcuts

## anykey answer

Answer your phone by pressing any key on your keypad:

## shortcuts

### a few ways to make your phone easier to use

silence ringtone	Press either side volume key when your phone rings.

## messages

## create & send a message

- Press ♠ > ♥ Messages > Create Message.
- 2 Select a message type and enter the message text (see page 16).
- To insert a picture, sound, or other object, press Options > Insert.
- When you finish the message, press Send. Choose one or more people to send to and press Send.

## receive a message

Press **View** to read the message immediately, or save it in your message inbox for viewing later.

Find it: ♠ > ♥ Messages > Message Inbox

### voicemail

When you **receive** a voicemail message, your phone shows an indicator and **New Voicemail**. Press **Call** to call your voicemail and follow the prompts.



## messages

### enter text

When you are in a text entry screen, press # to switch text entry modes:

- tap (abc) Standard method for entering text on your phone. Regular Tap method cycles through the letters and numbers of the key you press.
- iTAP™ (亞) Combines your single key presses and predicts each word as you enter it. If the word is not correct, press ·ŷ· right or left to scroll through the possible combinations.

Press to enter a space and move on the next word.

Press to enter punctuation. Finally, press to switch capitalisation modes if you need to (although in most cases this is done for you).

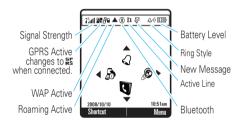
### To assign default text entry modes:

In a text entry screen, press  $\mbox{Options} > \mbox{Input Setup} > \mbox{Primary}$  or  $\mbox{Secondary}.$ 

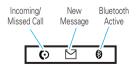
## status indicators

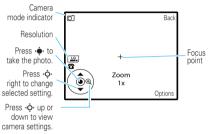

1 Press to see the viewfinder.



- Press Send to send the photo in a message. Press Options to store or discard the photo.



Note: Before taking your photo, you can press Options to open the camera menu. From here you can access features such as Auto-Timed Capture, Camera Setup and Free Space.

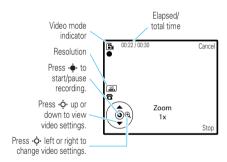
**Tip:** Use **Auto save** in **Camera Setup** to automatically save your photos.

when music is what you need...

# what music transfer tools do I need?

To put music on your computer and then load it on your phone, you need:

- A Microsoft® WindowsXP™ or Windows Vista™ PC
- USB data cable (sold separately)

## do I need a memory card?

Your phone does have 30 MB of internal memory, but it also supports removable microSD memory cards with up to 2 GB capacity, allowing you to store much more data.

**Note:** Motorola approved SanDisk cards are recommended for cards greater than 1 GB.

# set up music

# what music file formats can I play?

Your phone can play many types of files:MP3, AAC, AMR, WAV, MIDI and iMelody.

### do I need a USB cable?

To load music from a computer to your phone, you must use a USB data cable, which may be sold separately from your phone.

**Note:** If you have a removable memory card and a memory card reader, you don't need a cable. See page 24.

## what headphones can I use?

Your phone has a 2.5 mm headset jack for wired stereo listening. Or, go wireless and use optional Bluetooth stereo headphones to listen to your music (see page 32 for more information).

**Note:** When listening to music using a Bluetooth stereo device, use the volume keys (page 4) to increase and decrease the music volume.

copy your favourite tunes...

## rip a CD

Not literally — if you're new to music this means transferring music from an audio CD to your PC.

To rip an audio CD on your PC, you need Windows Media Player version 10 or later. You can download Windows Media Player from www.microsoft.com.

- On your computer, launch Windows® Media Player.
- Insert an audio CD into your computer's CD ROM drive.

**Note:** Make sure you change the format to, MP3, AAC, AMR, WAV, MIDI or iMelody in the Rip Settings. (MP3 is the recommended format for best performance.)

- In the Windows Media Player window, click on the "Rip" tab.
- Highlight the songs you want to import and click "Rip Music".

The songs are imported to the Windows Media Player Library. Next, transfer the songs from your computer to your phone.

# transfer music to your phone

Transfer files from a computer to your phone or removable memory card.

### PC to phone

To load files from a **PC to your phone**, you need a USB cable.

- With a memory card inserted and your phone in the home screen, insert the USB cable in your phone and your Windows PC.
  - Note: Your phone supports Microsoft® Windows® XP™ and Windows Vista™. Other operating systems may not be compatible with your phone.
- Now that you've connected, use Windows Media Player or USB drag and drop to copy your music.

### Windows Media Player

- On your Windows PC, open Microsoft® Windows® Media Player 10 or later.
- On the Sync tab, select More Options. Under Device, select ZN200 Mobile.
- 3 Select **Properties**, check the "Create folder hierarchy on device" box, and click **OK**.

See page 35 for more information on transferring music to your phone.

### PC to memory card reader

Firstly, insert your memory card into the card reader (you may first need to insert the card into an adapter that fits into the card reader). Then, insert the card reader into an available USB port on your computer.

- On your Windows PC, open "My Computer" and click on the "Removable Disk" icon to access your phone's memory card.
- In the "Removable Disk" (memory card) window, create one or more folders for the files you will copy onto the memory card.

A file name (including the path) must be less than 255 characters. For example, if you copy songs into a folder you create that is named "MyMotoSongs," the name of any song PLUS the name of the folder "MyMotoSongs" must be less than 255 characters.

Warning: The "Mobile\Music", "Mobile\Pictures" and "Mobile\Videos" folders are used by your phone. **Do not delete these folders**.

Orag and drop desired files into the "Removable Disk" (memory card) window into a folder you created. Do not copy files to the main directory.

Note: Picture files must be copied to the "mobile\Picture" folders and Videos must be copied to the "mobile\Video" folder. Music files can be copied anywhere onto the memory card. To find your picture and video files on your phone, press

- •• > Multimedia > Pictures or Video, then press Options > Switch Storage > Memory Card.
- When finished, disconnect by clicking on the "Safely Remove Hardware" icon in the system tray on your computer screen, selecting "USB Mass Storage Device," and selecting "Stop."

#### listen to your favourite tunes...

Find it: ♠ > ❷ Multimedia > Music Library

**Note:** Your phone may not play MP3 files that have a bit rate higher than 320 kbps. If you try to download or play one of these files, your phone may display an error message or ask you to delete the file.

Tip: Connect a stereo headset for high quality music playback.

From the Music Library, open one of the following:

Now Playing	Select the track that is currently playing.
All Songs	Select a track to show or play songs.
Playlists	Play and manage your playlists.

- To select and play a playlist, scroll to the playlist and press Play.

## wake up music player

While the music player is active, your phone will conserve battery power by turning off the display and keypad backlights.

To turn display and backlights back on, press any key.

## turn off music player

To turn the music player off, press ①.

## music player tips

If you receive a call while playing music, the music pauses. You can **Ignore** the call and send the caller to voicemail or **Answer** the call. Playing resumes when you end the call.

To hide your music player while a song is playing, press •• > Hide. If the music player is hidden, you can use other phone features. Using applications like games or FM radio turns the music player off.

## FM radio

### listen to your favourite news or music programme

To use the FM Radio you need to connect a stereo headset to the 2.5 mm headset jack.

- Press ô up or down to change the frequency.
- Press • left or right to scan for preset radio stations.
- Press the up or down volume keys on the side of the phone to adjust the volume.
- Press to mute the radio.

### use the radio presets

- Tune in the desired frequency by pressing o up or down, or press Options > Scan to scan for all available radio stations.
- Press and hold a number key to save that number as the preset.
- To select the preset station, press the keypad number.

## **Bluetooth®**

### lose the wires and go wireless

Your phone supports Bluetooth wireless connections with audio devices, such as a handsfree headset or music system.

Note: The use of wireless phones while driving may cause distraction. Discontinue a call if you can't concentrate on driving. Additionally, the use of wireless devices and their accessories may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Always obey the laws and regulations on the use of these products.

For maximum Bluetooth security, you should always connect Bluetooth devices in a safe, private environment.

### use a headset or car kit

Before you try to connect your phone with a headset, car kit or other audio device, make sure the device is on and ready in pairing or bonding mode (see the user's guide for the device).

Find it: ♠ > ❤ Settings > Bluetooth Link > Add Audio Device



### **Bluetooth®**

If Bluetooth is switched off, you will be prompted to turn it on. Your phone now lists the devices it finds within range:

- Scroll to a device in the list and press the centre key •.
- 2 If necessary, press Yes or OK to connect to the device.
- If necessary, enter the device passkey (such as 0000) and press 0K.

When your phone is connected, the Bluetooth indicator is highlighted in the status bar and displayed on the top of the phone.

Shortcut: When your phone's Bluetooth power is on, your phone can automatically connect to a handsfree device you have used before. Just turn on the device, or move it near the phone. If the device doesn't connect, turn it off and back on.

# personal organiser

stay on top of things with these handy features

### add & view calendar event

Find it: • > • Tools > Calendar

Scroll to the desired day and press •• , then scroll to [Add New] and press Select to add, or scroll to the event and press Select to view.

**Note:** When an event reminder occurs, press • to view it. Press **Exit** to dismiss it.

### set alarm

Find it: ♠ > ♠ Tools > Alarm Clock

### calculator

Find it: ♠ > ♠ Tools > Calculator

Tip: To convert currency, enter your currency figure and press Options and select Exampe Rate. Select Convert to calculate your new currency figure.

# **USB & memory card**

Connect your phone and PC, then drag & drop.

### format

You need to format a memory card, **using the phone**, before using it for the first time. This creates the necessary folders and ensures your phone can read the contents of the card. Your phone will prompt you if you need to format your memory card.

Caution: Formatting the memory card erases all content on the card.

## drag & drop

**Note:** Please download the USB charging driver onto your PC, at <a href="http://www.motorola.com/support">http://www.motorola.com/support</a>.

With a memory card inserted and your phone in the home screen, insert the USB cable in your phone and your Windows PC.

Note: Your phone supports Microsoft® Windows XP™ and Windows Vista™. Other operating systems may not be compatible with your phone.

# **USB & memory card**

Use the My Computer window to find Removable Device (sometimes shown as ("NO NAME").

**Note:** When your phone is plugged into a PC and is being used as a mass storage device, it cannot be used for anything else. To restore the phone to normal use, disconnect it from the PC.

To change a code or password:

# lock & unlock phone

You can lock your phone to keep others from using it.

Find it: ·♠ > ❤️ Settings > Security > Phone Lock > Lock Now or Automatic Lock

Enter the four-digit unlock code and press **OK**. Your phone first displays **Phone Locked**, and then shows **Enter Unlock Code** until the next time you unlock your phone.

**To unlock your phone**, enter your four-digit code and press **OK**.

# battery use & safety

# **Specific Absorption Rate Data**

# This model meets international guidelines for exposure to radio waves

Your mobile device is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed not to exceed the limits for exposure to radio waves recommended by international guidelines. These guidelines were developed by the independent scientific organization ICNIRP and include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The guidelines use a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The ICNIRP SAR limit for mobile devices used by the general public is 2 W/kg and the highest SAR value for this device when tested at the ear is 0.59 W/kg. As mobile devices offer a range of functions, they can be used in other positions, such as on the body as described in this user's guide. In this case, the highest tested SAR value is 0.61 W/kg.

As SAR is measured utilizing the device's highest transmitting power, the actual SAR of this device while operating is typically below that indicated above. This is due to automatic changes to the power level of the device to ensure it only uses the minimum level required to reach the network.

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the quidelines.

The World Health Organization has stated that present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for the use of mobile devices. They note that if you want to reduce your exposure then you can do so by limiting the length of calls or using a "handsfree" device to keep the mobile phone away from the head and body.

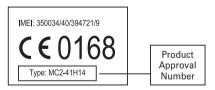

# Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

# **Product Operation**

### Drive Safe. Call Smart

Your mobile device lets you communicate by voice and data—almost anywhere, anytime, wherever wireless service is available and safe conditions allow. When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. If you choose to use your mobile device while driving, remember the following tips:

- Get to know your Motorola mobile device and its features such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
- When available, use a handsfree device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience to your mobile device with one of the many Motorola Original handsfree accessories available today.
- Position your mobile device within easy reach.

Be able to access your mobile device without removing your eyes from the road. If you receive an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voicemail answer it for you.

- Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice, and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a "to do" list or going through your address book takes attention away from your primary responsibility—driving safely.
- Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when your car is not moving or before pulling into traffic. If you must make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that can divert your attention away from the road
- Use your mobile device to call for help. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, or medical emergencies.\*
- Use your mobile device to help others in emergencies. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress, or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.\*
- Call roadside assistance or a special non-emergency wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.\*
